SCHOLARSHIP IN PROGRESS

"E-racing the Face of International Adoption," a research project on the racialization of foreign-born children adopted by "white" North American parents. This project has been funded by the National Science Foundation, and the NSF is now considering a second proposal for funding for this project. I plan to expand my study of racialization in families formed by international adoption by continuing interviews I began in Europe. (I've started in Austria, but would like to expand the sample population to include parents in English- and German-speaking European countries.) The likeliest result of this research will be another single-author book manuscript.

I am co-editing (with Manuela Boatça, Freie Universität Berlin) a Sage Monograph/special issue of *Current Sociology*, the journal of the International Sociological Association. The theme is *Modernity and Inequality*, and it is slated for publication in late 2014 or early 2015.

"Comparative Racial Structures," an article offering a template for comparative-historical study of racial paradigms and offering a new and more useful way to organize and therefore understand scholarship on race. The first draft of this work was presented on a panel at the 2008 Boston meetings of the American Sociological Association.

PLANNED PROJECTS

I plan to expand my study of transnational immigrant social networks. To date, I've studied networks among Afro-Caribbean people with networks that originate from several islands in the Eastern Caribbean and traverse Canada, the United States, and England. From this work, I developed a model I named "the Hub and Spoke" network of transnational migration; the model is described and explained in my book *Survival of the Knitted* (Stanford University Press, 2007). I plan to study networks with other origins and destinations to determine whether that model as I developed it is as universal as I indicated in that book. I have particular interests in networks that originate in West Africa, and also in Eastern Europe. This work would require the assistance of several graduate students, and linkages with labs in universities located at the relevant migrant origin and destination sites. My goal is to train graduate students in both qualitative research methods and transnational cross-population research design in order to complete additional phases of this research.
